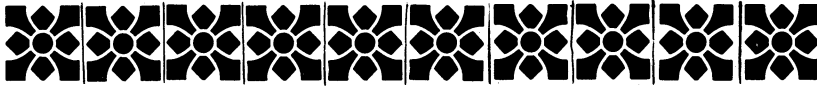

The past decade has witnessed a tremendous growth in student involvement in matters affecting college life. One result has been the rapid development of legal concepts relating to students. This volume appraises these recent developments in a manner understandable to laymen, but with sufficient reference to legal authorities that the work will stand as professionally sound. The authors believe that the law in the area of student relationships with college has proved to be a major force for change, and that student recognition of this has led to increasing judicial recourse rather than violent confrontation. This book explains student rights in many different areas, ranging from admissions and confidentiality of records to demonstrations and due process, both to the students themselves and to the administrators with whom they deal.
