Conference briefings and reviews should be no more than 500 words. Correspondence on subjects of topical interest are welcome but letters should be no more than 350 words, with up to three references, and should not include diagrams or tables.

Contributions are accepted for publication on the condition that their substance has not been published or submitted for publication elsewhere. The views expressed in articles published in the *Psychiatric Bulletin* (except official College material) are the authors' own and do not necessarily represent College policy. All material submitted for publication in the *Psychiatric Bulletin* should be accompanied by a covering letter to the editor signed by all authors.
