WHOLE-TIME COURSES FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

16 February–23 May 1970 and 3 August–7 November 1970

BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; 6 on applied pharmacology; and 8 on histological and pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the brain, and this occupies about five periods.

16 February–13 March 1970 and 3 August–28 August 1970

BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Students of Neurology.

This course includes 20 lectures on the anatomy of the brain, spinal cord and motor tracts, 6 lectures on the physiological properties and 5 periods of dissection of the brain.

5 January–14 February 1970 and 29 June–8 August 1970

INTENSIVE CLINICAL LECTURE PERIOD for Post-Primary Fellowship, Part II D.L.O. and other students.

These periods are primarily designed to give a clinical survey of the whole field of the Specialty as a preliminary to practical clinical training. At the completion of the Intensive Lecture Period, selected students may be given the opportunity to serve as house surgeons in the associated hospitals.

18 May–30 May 1970 and 4 November–17 November 1970

PRACTICAL REVISION CLASS for Part II D.L.O. students.

This is intended for those students who are well advanced in preparation for the examination and need only the opportunity for a final review. The class includes demonstrations of selected clinical cases and viva voce examinations.

16 March–1 April 1970 and 28 September–10 October 1970

ADVANCED REVISION COURSE for students taking higher surgical examinations.

General notes

This is limited to senior students who are about to take the Final examination. In addition to a series of lecture/discussions at the appropriate level in the Specialty and in related branches of general surgery, there are a number of clinical and viva voce sessions and arrangements for the setting and correction of test papers.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any of the courses listed overleaf and of the short course on specific aspects which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary-Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangement with the Dean. This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

Demonstrations of clinical cases, open clinical lectures and pathological conferences are held at regular intervals throughout the year, and are open without fee to all trainees in the Specialty. A list giving dates and times is obtainable in the Secretary-Administrator's office.

COURSE ON SURGICAL TREATMENT OF CHRONIC OTITIS MEDIA

A course on Surgical Treatment of Chronic Otitis Media will be held at the Theodor Heuss Academy and at the Municipal City Hospital in Gummersbach (Cologne) West Germany, from 1 to 5 June 1970.

General notes

The course will include lectures, discussion, motion pictures, surgical demonstrations on colour closed-circuit television and temporal bone work. The lectures and demonstrations will be in English. Simultaneous translations will be in French and German. Special emphasis will be given to the technique of preservation of the posterior bony canal wall (posterior tympanotomy, intact canal wall technique).

DEPARTMENT OF OTOLARYNGOLOGY AND MAXILLOFACIAL SURGERY

A course on the management of Maxillofacial Injuries will be held at the University of Iowa, 11–15 May 1970. Limited to fourteen otolaryngologists, preferably those engaged in academic practice, the course will deal with the immediate and delayed treatment of injuries to the soft tissues and underlying skeletal structures of the face, and with associated dental problems. In addition to lectures and demonstrations, ample laboratory practice will be given in methods of open and closed reduction, interdental fixation and suture techniques.

COLLEGIUM MEDICORUM TEATRI

During the IXth International Congress of Otorhinolaryngology, representative Laryngologists from Argentina, Brazil, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, France, Germany, Great Britain, Japan, Mexico, Spain, Switzerland, and the United States founded an association dedicated to the vocal problems of singers and actors.

The Collegium Medicorum Teatri (or COMET) was formed to encourage the scientific investigation of the physiology and pathology of the voice of singers and actors, and to improve the clinical care of these professional voice users. Membership in this organization is limited to physicians or voice scientists, who are connected with major theatres, operas, or conservatories, or who have demonstrated special dedication to the physiology and pathology of the voice in singers and actors.

An interdisciplinary Seminar on the Voice of Singers and Actors is planned for 1970 in New York in cooperation with the Julliard School of Music. The first meeting of the Collegium is scheduled in Buenos Aires during the summer of 1971. SYMPOSIUM ANNOUNCEMENT

The Department of Otolaryngology at the University of Minnesota announces an *International Symposium on Clinical Otolology* to be held in Minneapolis, Minnesota on 18, 19 and 20 June 1970.

This Symposium is designed to be of special interest to the man in clinical otolaryngology practice and will concentrate on an in-depth review of current clinical otology. The guest faculty will include Drs. Ettore Bocca (Italy), Dietrich Plester (Germany), Karsten Kettel (Denmark), Howard House, Frederick Guilford, Harold Schuknecht and George Shambaugh, Jr. In addition, faculty members of the University of Minnesota, College of Medical Sciences, and the Mayo Graduate School of Medicine will participate. Topics to be covered during the Symposium include: office otology; preoperative principles and diagnostic considerations; stereo audiometry and problems of the auditory central nervous system; current trends in audiology; otosclerosis; congenital stapes fixation and congenital stenosis; surgical considerations in congenital malformations of the external and middle ear; chronic otitis media and mastoiditis; current tympanoplasty trends in Europe and America; diagnosis and management of vestibular disease; Bell's palsy; sudden deafness; tympanosclerosis; trauma; current state of organ transplant; transplants in otology; sensori-neural deafness; and middle-ear fluid problems.

Live closed-circuit television using large screen projection of on-going surgery will be used for some of the instruction by the guest faculty. Surgical cases for demonstration will include stapedectomy for otosclerosis, congenital conductive deafness or congenital stenosis, tympanoplasty, tympanotomy and mastoid surgery.

Registration for the Symposium will be limited. The registration fee is \$150. Residents may register for \$50.00 with approval of their Department Chairman. A limited number of spaces are being reserved for Audiologists who may also register at a reduced rate of \$50.00. This fee includes the cost of luncheons, local transportation to the course, and a Symposium Banquet. JAMES YEARSLEY LECTURE

The 16th Annual James Yearsley Lecture will take place on Friday 6 March at 5 p.m. at the Royal Society of Medicine. Mr. John Ballantyne will lecture on 'Iatrogenic Deafness'.

HEARING IN CHILDREN

Continuing Education in Medicine and Health Sciences University Extension, and the School of Medicine, UCLA announce two consecutive courses dealing with ear problems in children to be given by UCLA and guest faculty during the week of 18 May through 22 May 1970.

'Hearing in Children' will be presented 18-19 May 1970. Course Co-chairmen: Victor Goodhill, M.D., Professor of Surgery (Otology) and Irwin Harris, M.D., Associate Clinical Professor of Surgery (Otology). Embryology and paediatric oto-anatomy will precede discussions of psychoacoustics, neonatal testing, auditory maturation, cortical computerized audiometry, and identification audiometry. Advances in basic general paediatric audiology will be presented. Paediatric vestibular testing (electronystagmography) and diagnostic polytome temporal bone radiography will complete the first day. On the second day, specific problems such as rubella, Rh factor, prematurity, cerebral palsy, and genetic deafness will precede a session on communicative habilitation of the deaf infant and child. During this session, hearing aid problems and educational controversial areas will be presented by panels.

Course tuition \$50.00. Residents and graduate students no charge.

'Paediatric Otology—Medical and Otosurgical Problems' will follow on 20, 21, and 22 May 1970. Course Co-chairmen: Victor Goodhill, M.D., Professor of Surgery (Otology) and Seymour J. Brockman, M.D., Associate Clinical Professor of Surgery (Otology). Serous otitis, latent cholesteatoma, and traumatic perforations will be explored in depth. Panels will deal with complications of otitis and mastoiditis including facial paralysis and intracranial problems. Recent advances in radiology, microbiology, and oto-pathology will precede discussions of congenital and acquired atresia, cleft palate ear problems, and mastoidectomy-tympanoplasty techniques in children. Autogenous tragal cartilage and perichondrium uses will be described in detail along with 'open' vs. 'closed' techniques.

Course tuition \$125.00. Residents and graduate students no charge.

Both courses will be conducted along work-shop lines with appropriate audio-visual aids. Question and answer sessions will follow controversial area presentations by panels.
