A collection of letters exchanged between the Nobel Prize winner and his brilliant cousin, published in a Russian-language edition.

Olga Freidenberg, one of Russia's most important philologists, and her cousin, Boris Pasternak, were roughly the same age and kept up a lifelong correspondence. Miss Freidenberg's contribution to the exchange was on an equal footing with that of her more famous cousin, and this book is supplemented with extracts from her meticulously kept

diary. Edited with an elucidating commentary and notes. The English-language edition is scheduled for publication early in 1982.

BORIS PASTERNAK, author of *Dr. Zhivago*, was awarded the Nobel Prize in 1958. OLGA FREIDENBERG was founder of the Classical Division at Leningrad University.

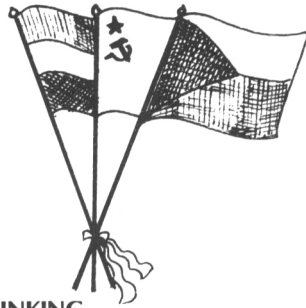
The policy of the *Slavic Review* is not to consider materials that have been published or that are being considered for publication elsewhere.
