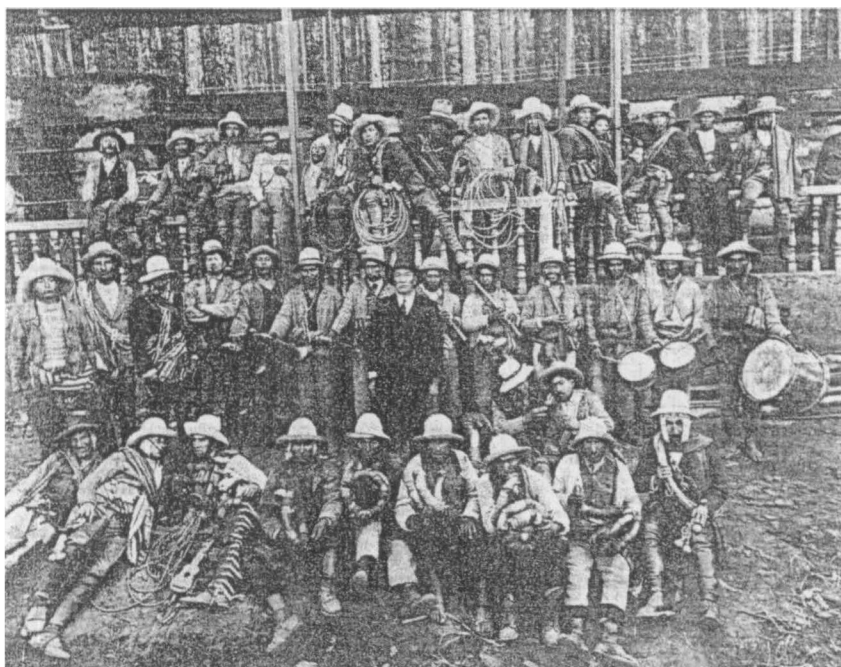

Call for Papers

The Forum on European Expansion and Global Interaction will hold its second biennial meeting at the Henry Huntington Library in San Marino, California, on 3 & 4 April 1998. The Forum is concerned with the expansion of Europe and the world-wide response to that expansion, from its beginnings in the fourteenth century to the middle of the nineteenth century. It seeks participation by scholars in all areas of the field and encourages submissions from individuals with an interdisciplinary focus. Both individual and group proposals are welcomed; proposals for round-table discussions will also be considered. Past panels have addressed questions relating to the role of the military in the governance of empire, transnational commerce, race, gender, and the emergence of colonial identity. Proposals for individual papers and entire session, including both a 250-word abstract for each paper and a *curriculum vitae* for each participant must reach the Forum by 15 October 1997.
