College, Cambridge, as an exhibitioner to read medicine. He qualified MRCS (Eng), LRCP (London) in 1931 and did his 'house jobs' at the General Infirmary, Leeds and the London Hospital.

He joined the RAF Medical Branch in the 1930s, in which he served with distinction. He was awarded the Viceroy's Certificate for his service in the Qualton Earthquake and in 1943 was mentioned in despatches.

In the late 1930s, when psychiatry was becoming a recognized specialty in the RAF, Tompkins was appointed a specialist neuropsychiatrist and obtained the DPM Eng. in 1938. He was elected MRCPsych in 1972 and proceeded to the Fellowship in 1977.

It was during the war that Tompkins, when stationed at RAF Medical Headquarters, Kelvin House, London, became interested in electrophysiology, an interest he pursued after his retirement from the RAF when he was appointed Honorary Consultant Neurophysiologist, Southampton and South West Hants Health District.

It was my privilege to have worked under Victor Tompkins, both as a medical student at Leeds when he was 'on the

house', and in the RAF when he was appointed a neuropsychiatrist at Kelvin House. His outstanding characteristics were his exuberant bonhomie and his total absence of side or prejudice. I have every reason to appreciate them all.
