WHOLE TIME COURSES FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

7 AUGUST–11 NOVEMBER 1972

BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; 6 on applied pharmacology; and 8 on histological and pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the relevant parts, and this occupies about 120 hours.

7 AUGUST–2 SEPTEMBER 1972

BASIC SCIENCES CLASS for Students of Neurology.

This course includes 20 lectures on the anatomy of the brain, spinal cord and motor tracts, 6 lectures on the physiological properties and 5 periods of dissection of the brain.

25 SEPTEMBER–7 OCTOBER 1972

ADVANCED REVISION COURSE for students taking higher surgical examinations.

This is limited to senior students who are about to take the Final examination. In addition to a series of lecture/discussions at the appropriate level in the Specialty and in related branches of general surgery, there are a number of clinical and viva voce sessions and arrangements for the setting and correction of test papers.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any of the courses listed overleaf and of the short courses on specific aspects which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary-Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangement with the Dean. This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

Demonstrations of clinical cases, open clinical lectures and clinical pathological conferences are held at regular intervals throughout the year, and are open without fee to all trainees in the Specialty. A list giving dates and times is obtainable in the Secretary-Administrator's office.

I NOVEMBER-14 NOVEMBER 1972

PRACTICAL REVISION CLASS for Part II D.L.O. students.

This is intended for those students who are well advanced in preparation for the examination and need only the opportunity for a final review. The class includes demonstrations of selected clinical cases and viva voce examinations.

Although designed for 'the beginner', this course is quite comprehensive, encompassing a wide variety of techniques.

1973 COURSE—EAR SURGERY COURSE

J. Brown Farrow and Valdemar Jordan will give a Course, EAR SURGERY, in Tampa, Florida, at St. Joseph's Hospital on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, 19, 20 and 21 February 1973, with Scientific Exhibits and Conferences through Saturday, 24 February, 1973.

This year's Course will be primarily on surgery of the chronic ear with presentation of problem cases requiring revisions and stressing correctable causes of failure. Adequate time will be allowed for discussions.

INTENSIVE COURSE IN OTOLOGIC SURGERY

An intensive course in Otolologic Surgery will be given 15–19 January 1973, by the Los Angeles Foundation of Otolology and the University of Southern California School of Medicine in co-operation with St. Vincent's Hospital.

The course will consist of lectures, televised surgery and motion pictures on the following subjects: chronic otitis media, otosclerosis, pediatric otology, glomus tumors, acoustic tumors, facial nerve paralysis, and the dizzy patient.

This program is acceptable for 45 1/2 instructional hours of Group A credit toward the California Medical Association's Certificate in Continuing Medical Education.

A tuition fee of \$300, payable in United States currency to the Los Angeles Foundation of Otolology, includes the cost of the noon luncheons.

Tuition for doctors on active duty in the United States Armed Forces and residents in otolaryngology has been reduced to \$100. Applications from residents must be accompanied by a letter from their Chief of Service.
