CONCERTO CI Now Approved for SSD

The world's smallest cochlear implant, the CONCERTO from MED-EL, has been approved by the Therapeutic Goods Administration (TGA) for Australians with Single-Sided Deafness (SSD). The CONCERTO is part of the MAESTRO CI System.

Now Australians with SSD can, for the first time, receive a hearing implant that allows them to hear with both ears.

The exceptionally thin and reliable implant design is optimised for minimally-invasive surgical techniques, making it an ideal solution for both children and adults.

"Working closely with our customers and professional partners, MED-EL has driven this research initiative so that individuals with SSD can enjoy the benefits of binaural hearing instead of relying on just one hearing ear," said MED-EL CEO, Dr. Ingeborg Hochmair.
