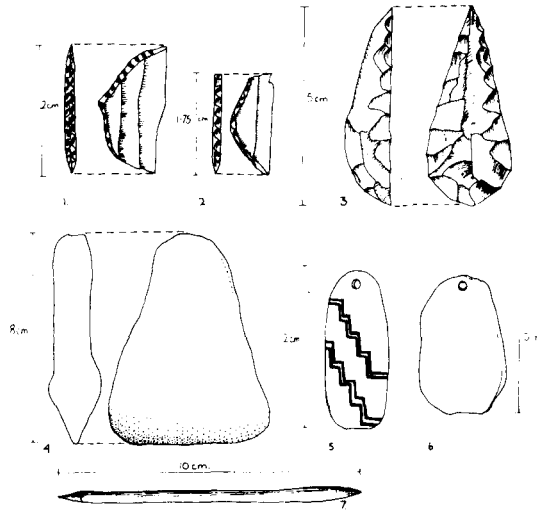

ANTHROPOLOGICAL LITERATURE is the most comprehensive index of current articles available to anthropologists and researchers in tangent disciplines. It lists significant materials in all languages, although the major languages of collection are English, French, Spanish, German, and Slavic. Collections of anthropological essays — such as, symposia, colloquia, festschriften, and collections of readings — are also indexed. The 9,000 to 10,000 entries compiled each year are organized into five classified sections: (1) cultural/social anthropology (economic, political, social, religious, other); (2) archaeology; (3) biological/physical anthropology; (4) linguistics; (5) general, method, and theory.
