## RUSSIA SINCE KHRUSHCHEV

The summer 1965 issue of *Survey* presents a critical analysis of trends in Soviet domestic and foreign policy in 1964-65, particularly since the fall of N. S. Khrushchev last year. Among the subjects reviewed: the state of Soviet industry and agriculture, the introduction of reforms in the economic field, Soviet foreign policy, military strategy, and diplomacy in recent years, changes in party structure and leadership, the 'new men', their policies and aims. Leading Western scholars also comment in this special number of *Survey* on the new cultural policies and the work of the younger poets.

Recent visitors to the Soviet Union report their impressions gained in various parts of the Soviet Union. Documentary articles deal with subjects only infrequently discussed in the past, such as the automobile in Soviet life and tourism in the Eastern bloc.
