JOHN E. BERECOCHEA resides in Oakland, California, where he is a research criminologist in private practice. He is currently doing quantitative research on plea bargaining, prisoner classification, juvenile courts, and California prison history.

RICHARD A. BERK is a Professor of Sociology and Director of the Social Process Research Institute at the University of California, Santa Barbara. He has published widely in the fields of family violence, sociology of law, and evaluation research. Ongoing projects include an evaluation of local efforts to reduce wife battery among offenders who have come to the attention of the criminal justice system.
