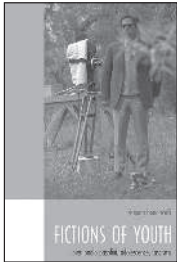

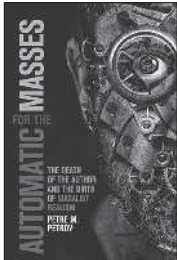
*Fictions of Youth* explores the ways in which youth shaped Pier Paolo Pasolini's prose, poetry, and cinema.

This book illuminates Northrop Frye's early life, his research, and his thought processes.

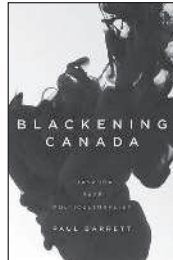


### Automatic for the Masses

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
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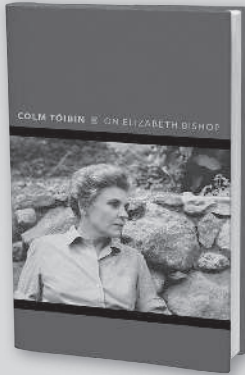
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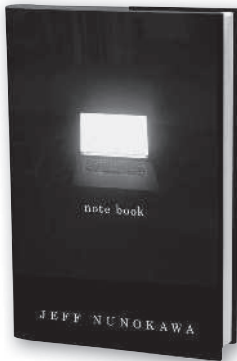
## On Elizabeth Bishop

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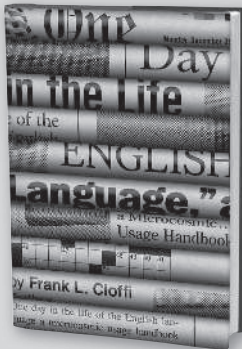
## Note Book

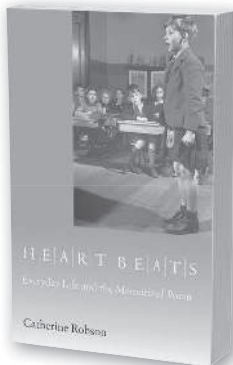
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
