This textbook, prepared for American students who have already completed two semesters of Chinese, does not "talk down" to the student, and its contemporary subject matter will certainly provoke classroom discussion. Successfully encouraging speaking as well as reading practice, the book progresses from correspondence and dialogue to short essays.

Lessons 1 through 10 focus on college life in the United States, 11 through 15 concern political and social issues in contemporary China, and 16 through 20 present biographies of three well-known figures in Chinese intellectual history and analyses of the Chinese Democracy Movement. Lessons 21 and 22 deal with Chinese translations of foreign place names and the Gulf War and accustom students to reading Chinese newspapers.

The lessons in this text offer sufficient material for a two-semester course with five contact hours per week. For the text and vocabulary, traditional and simplified characters are juxtaposed. The exercises of each lesson are included in the vocabulary volume. An index to the glossary is included.

The editor welcomes preliminary inquiries about manuscripts for possible publication in *The Journal of Asian Studies*. Completed manuscripts should be sent to the editor, David D. Buck, JAS, Department of History, University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, Milwaukee, WI 53201. Please submit four copies. All submitted work should be double-spaced, including extracts, notes, and references. Because manuscripts cannot be returned, please do not send the original. Consult recent issues of the *Journal* as a guide to the format for source citations, notes, and references. Footnotes should be as few as possible and typed double-spaced at the end of the text. Documentation should follow the style recommended in sections 15.4 through 15.35 of *The Chicago Manual of Style*, 13th ed. (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1982), pp. 400–408. All manuscripts submitted to the JAS are expected not to have been published elsewhere and not to be under review for possible publication elsewhere. Manuscripts, including notes, should not be more than 40 pages in length.

Authors are encouraged to submit tables, figures, and black-and-white photographs, and other illustrations along with their manuscripts. Photocopies or photos of record are acceptable for first review and should accompany the manuscript at original submission. Authors who wish to illustrate their articles with photographs must provide black-and-white glossy prints of good quality at the time of final delivery of their copyedited manuscript. Please provide a separate, typewritten, double-spaced list of captions and legends for all illustrations, keyed by number to each figure or photograph, including all necessary credit or permission lines. Authors are responsible for securing and paying for permission to use illustrative material. Do not write on the back of photographs or paste photographs to sheets of paper. Identify each photo by typing the first words of its caption on a stick-on label, then affix the label to the back of the photo. Photographs will be returned after publication.
