Many have found that the most meaningful study of American Constitutional Law is achieved through reading and analyzing the reported opinions of the Supreme Court justices, skilfully selected, edited and annotated.

Published only a few months ago, the new edition of this standard work is based on the belief that noteworthy decisions of the Supreme Court are not merely data, but events—legal, political and even literary. This book preserves the flavor of the cases as cases through full statements of facts and procedures, and as Great Debates through the generous inclusion of dissenting and concurring opinions.

The general organization is topical, thus permitting an integrated treatment of different sections of the Constitution bearing on a single problem. Each topic, however, is introduced by a consideration of the historic problems and decisions germane to it.

Of an earlier edition of this book, Alan F. Westin wrote: "I think this is, all elements considered, the best constitutional law casebook around. I particularly like the way in which the editors have broadened the materials to include legislative debates, committee reports, transcripts of oral arguments before the Court, and similar items which permit a better appreciation of the constitutional process."

The first volume of this two-volume work deals with the topics of Judicial Review and Problems of Federalism. The second is devoted to the constitutional safeguards of Liberty and Property. Each volume contains, in addition to the text of the Constitution, the complete Index and Table of Cases for both.
