act' and 'never talked about himself' (420); and many others. If two further names stand out as together constituting both the driving-force and the inter-connecting link, they are those of Dr. J. R. Mott and Dr. J. H. Oldham, both of them, like Lunn and Gardiner, laymen. With Dr. Ruth Rouse, to whom, as Editorial Secretary, this *History* owes its direction and detailed planning, as well as her own two chapters, Dr. Mott and Dr. Oldham were present at Edinburgh in 1910; and in 1948 all three saw the crowning of their and others' labours in the formation of the W.C.C. at Amsterdam. 'Never before has so short a period seen such rapid progress in thought and action' (731).
