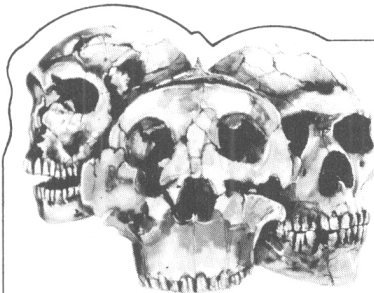

An Archaeological Perspective

by LEWIS R. BINFORD

This book brings together the articles of Lewis R. Binford—one of the most controversial and influential figures in modern archeology. These papers—four of them previously unpublished—were all written during the past 15 years and reflect Binford's development of an explicit scientific approach to archeological research. Binford is known not only for the power of his ideas, but for the vigor with which he expresses them. His introduction to *An Archeological Perspective* is a highly personal account of his experiences as a rebel anthropologist whose concepts have only recently been accepted by traditional archeologists. With candor reminiscent of Watson's *The Double Helix*, he describes the intense conflicts and passions that arise when man studies man.

The rest of the book is divided into four sections—Method and Archeological Reasoning, Method of Data Collection, Theory and Assumptions, and Analysis—each of them introduced in a short essay by Professor Binford. He covers a variety of topics—from historical site materials through the Acheulian era of over 400,000 years ago—yet integrates them all into a theoretical-methodological framework that treats archeology as a true anthropological discipline, and not simply as artifact history. He devotes special attention to problems of understanding the origins of agriculture and reconstructing facets of prehistoric social organization.
