The Foreign Policy of Palmerston 1830–1841

By **SIR CHARLES WEBSTER**

A full account of Palmerston's first two periods at the Foreign Office, during the Grey and Melbourne Ministries, which is now available. The sub-title of the book is 'Britain, the Liberal Movement and the Eastern Question'; the first of the two volumes deals mainly with the Liberal Movement and the second with the Eastern Question from 1835 onwards.

In addition to British and foreign archives Sir Charles has been permitted to have unrestricted use of the private correspondence of Palmerston at Broadlands, which is especially copious for these years and the total amount of unpublished material handled is not less than that which formed the foundation of the two volumes on Castlereagh.
