

references in the book. When I did this, I guessed between 2,000 and 3,000 references. I was wrong.

As counted by my research assistant, Emily Ford, over an intense, four-hour period, there are 4,949 references in the third edition of *NA*. This is over twice as many references as in the second edition (2,376 references), which in turn has over twice as many as in the first edition (767). To illustrate Lezak's vast literature review, I perused sections of the text about tests which I have co-authored and learned of recent, relevant articles of which I was unaware.

To summarize, it is hard for me to fathom the amount of work that Muriel Lezak had to exert in the research and writing of this book. She clearly has been one of the most

consistently devoted scholars in our field. We owe a great debt to her for carrying on this tradition of excellence.
