Music — Two world premier compositions for orchestra and chorus, among other selections, will be performed by the Indiana University School of Music at the historic Circle Theatre in downtown Indianapolis on the evening of April 7. *Claude Baker* and *Robert Ward* will create the pieces celebrating the diversity of public religious expressions in America.

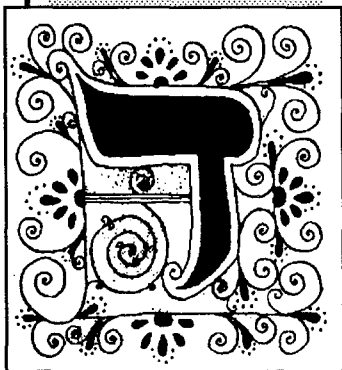
Literature — Author *John Updike* will read from his fiction and comment on the expression of religious themes in his work on Friday, April 8.

Visual Arts — The art of such photographers as *Walker Evans*, *Paul Strand*, and *Ansel Adams* will be displayed at a public exhibit that will run concurrent with the conference. The exhibit will reflect the regional diversity in religious architecture in America. Catalogue author *Peter Williams* and curator *Nan Brewer* have developed and designed the week-long exhibit.
