Where women head divisions or panels, there is a greater likelihood of other women being selected for program contributions. This year (and last) we had a male and a female cochairing the Program Committee. In 1996 15 of the 49 division persons were women (30.06%) (Cf. 1995: 38.8%). The divisions they headed had women as 26.1% (55 of 211) of the chairpersons, 35.1% (313 of 892) of the papergivers, and 29.8% (72 of 242) of the discussants (Cf. 1995 = 30.7%, 34.2%, 31.0%).

The convention divisions led by women had 40.4% of the convention's female panel chairs, 48.1% of the papergivers, and 50.7% of its discussants (Cf. 1995: 44.0, 48.0, 42.0). Women-chaired panels had 38.7% female paper givers and 33.9% female discussants (Cf. 1995: 41.0, 42.5%). These constituted 30.9% of the women giving papers at the 1996 convention and 30.3% of the women serving as discussants (Cf. 1995: 40.8%, 43.3%).

The divisions with the strongest female representation were those on Foundations of Political Theory*, Public Administration, Women and Politics*, Comparative Politics*, Politics and Society in Western Europe, Science, Technology, and Environmental Politics, Transformational Politics, New Political Science, Teaching and Learning in Political Science, and Race, Ethnicity, and Politics.

The divisions with the weakest female representation in 1995 were those on Formal Political Theory, Political Methodology*, Legislative Behavior*, Election and Electoral Behavior, Federalism and Intergovernmental Relations, International Collaboration, International Security, International Security and Arms Control, Foreign Policy Analysis, Representation and Electoral Systems, Conflict Processes, and Religion and Politics*.
