Principles of International Criminal Law, first published four years ago, has become a leading textbook in the field. Already in its second German edition, *Principles of International Criminal Law* has also appeared in Spanish, Italian and Chinese translations. Now we welcome the appearance of a new English edition, updated to take account of rapid developments in international criminal law.

The focus of the first edition has been retained. *Principles of International Criminal Law* offers a systematic analysis of the general principles, sources and evolution of substantive international criminal law, as well as a thorough discussion of specific international crimes. The updated second edition examines the emerging case law of the International Criminal Court and the most recent decisions rendered by the United Nations Tribunals for Yugoslavia and Rwanda. This edition also presents a greatly expanded discussion of transitional justice as well as a new chapter on the prosecution of international crimes in national and hybrid courts.

The author's thorough, systematic approach makes this volume a valuable textbook and an indispensable reference work for anyone concerned with the development and practice of international criminal law. A comprehensive index, an extensive table of cases, and a table of statutes and international instruments enhance its user-friendliness.

Gerhard Werle is Professor of International Criminal Law at Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin. He has been a visiting professor at various universities worldwide, including Columbia Law School, New York; Kansai University, Osaka; University of Sydney; University of Technology, Sydney; University of Cape Town; and University of the Western Cape, Cape Town, where he is Director of the South African-German Centre for Development Research and Criminal Justice. Professor Werle was a member of the Working Group on the Introduction of a Code of Crimes Against International Law established by the German Federal Ministry of Justice and is a member of the Expert Committee of the German Red Cross on International Humanitarian Law. His works on international criminal law, transitional justice and modern legal history have been published widely in many languages.

EDITORIAL POLICY & GUIDELINES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

The *Hague Journal on the Rule of Law* publishes two categories of articles: papers (approx. 6000–10,000 words) and notes (approx. 500–3000 words). Papers are accepted on the basis of double blind peer-review. Notes are accepted on the basis of review by two or more editors of the journal. Authors should feel free to make inquiries at the Editorial Office in case they consider writing a paper or a note. Authors are kindly requested to send their manuscript to the Editorial Office at any time of the year. All submitted materials should be in English. Submission and publication elsewhere

Manuscripts submitted to the *HJRL* must not be under consideration for publication elsewhere. Acceptance of the Editorial Board's offer to publish, implies that the author agrees to an embargo on publication elsewhere for a period of two years following the date of publication in the *HJRL*. After this two-year period, the author may republish the article elsewhere, provided only that the author notifies the Publisher and ensures that the Publisher is properly credited and that the relevant copyright notice is repeated verbatim.

Revision, language-editing and copy-editing

Authors are responsible for the language-editing of their texts and copy-editing in conformity with the guidelines for authors. After acceptance of a text for publication, the fully edited and correct text must be sent to the Editorial Office within four weeks. Any (minor) changes to the text must also be made within this four-week period. Authors will *not* receive formatted proofs for correction.

Books for Review

Books for review and proposals to review books should be addressed to the Editorial Office.

Fees

Authors will not receive a fee, but will be presented a complimentary issue of the *HJRL* in which their contribution appears.
