Jacques Michaux is professor at the Ecole Pratique des Hautes Etudes (Life and Earth Sciences section). His research follows three directions: the study of fossil muridae (rats, mice and the many species related to them), geological chronology, and evolution. As regards the last topic he is particularly interested in island rodents, as island conditions provide the opportunity for aspects of evolution that are marked by the acquisition of often extreme morphological characteristics, whose functional and adaptive significance and modes of introduction need to be established. The interesting aspects of species that live among humans therefore arise from their recent origin: when new species can be introduced into an island environment,

Michael Palencia-Roth Trowbridge Scholar in Literary Studies and Professor of Comparative and World Literature at the University of Illinois, has published books and monographs (authored and edited) on Gabriel García Márquez, Thomas Mann, James Joyce, the conquest period in Latin America, the Holocaust, comparative literature as a discipline, and comparative civilizational analysis. Jean-Noël Robert is professor in the Sciences of Religion section at the Ecole Pratique des Hautes Etudes, where he holds the chair in Japanese Buddhism. He has specialized in particular in the study of Buddhist doctrines as they developed in Japan starting in China, and especially the Tendai school, perhaps the most remarkable of them because of its scholastic system. At the moment he is working on medieval Japanese Buddhist poetry devoted to the Lotus Sûtra, as well as the first Chinese translation of the text. Member of the Académie des Inscriptions et Belles-Lettres since 2006, he is responsible for continuing the great project for a *Dictionnaire encyclopédique du bouddhisme* based on Chinese and Japanese sources (Hôbôgirin), which was started in 1926 and whose eighth volume was published in 2003.
