HOW TO LEARN RUSSIAN.

A MANUAL FOR STUDENTS OF RUSSIAN.

Based upon the Ollendorffian System of Teaching Languages, and Adapted for Self-Instruction.

The almost total neglect that the Russian Language has hitherto met with in this country is capable of two explanations, one of which may be said to include the other, namely, its supposed insurmountable difficulties and the want of a good Grammar. On the first point, suffice it to say that there is nothing—absolutely nothing—which should deter the student. The prominent features of the language are clearness and methodical arrangement. If the contrary have been found to be the case, it is owing to no other causes than the defective methods and the insufficient or faulty explanations presented by the Grammars hitherto published, both in this country and on the Continent.

Save to a select few, the bulk of a new, vigorous, and original literature, comprising invaluable geographical, ethnological, and linguistic treasures, the product of Slavonic life, thought, and culture as developed in Russia, has imparted nothing to the educated classes of England beyond a few paltry translations and a few names.

Owing to the recent and existing political complications in the East, a growing interest has at length been created in the Russian Language, and, in order to meet the demand for a good Grammar, Messrs. Trübner and Co. have caused the present work to be prepared.
