

## ABOUT THE AUTHORS

DONALD BLACK is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Sociology at the University of Virginia. He has published a number of books and articles on the social nature of law and related subjects.

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HOWARD S. ERLANGER is a Professor in the Law School and Department of Sociology at the University of Wisconsin, Madison.
