'It is both charming and scholarly, addressed with equal felicity to the art historian and the iconographer, to the devout, and to such other persons as have a decent curiosity. First come the single figures of the Saint (mainly details from larger pictures), and then the stories from his life, illustrated by Traini, Daddi, Fra Angelico and a few others. Each of the stories is accompanied by a translation from the life of the Saint by Theodoric of Appoldia, (c. 1290), which is the first to include all the narratives that are illustrated: at the same time the references are given to those passages in the earlier lives where particular scenes are reported. There are also short notes, sizes, readings of inscriptions, and a summary art-historical bibliography for each illustration; none of the scholarly requirements of different sorts of readers is neglected, and the result is a near approach to a model of what a modest volume of this kind should be.'
