✎ The Historical Association has published *Medieval and Reformation Germany (to 1648): A Select Bibliography*, by Lawrence D. Stokes, as No. 84 in its series, *Helps for Students of History* (1972). Directed to students without a command of German, it lists, with some commentary, books and articles in English. The author is preparing a second pamphlet covering the period from 1648 to the present.
