FOLGER LIBRARY FELLOWSHIPS. The Folger Library, Washington, D.C., announces a program of junior fellowships for individual research at the Folger. Applicants must have a research project appropriate to the Folger collections. Stipends up to \$1,500 per month for a term of one to three months are available. Preference will be given to those outside the Washington metropolitan area.
