### Aims and Scope

The *Leiden Journal of International Law* has been established to promote the understanding of international law and to describe current developments in this field. Special attention will be given to developments in the area of the prevention and peaceful settlement of international disputes, in its widest sense. The *Journal* aims to attract contributions from scholars, practitioners and students. Particular attention will be paid to publishing articles written by promising students.

### Submission of Manuscripts

**Articles:** The *Journal* invites the submission of unsolicited articles from scholars, practitioners and students of international law. The Editors are willing to consider proposals for articles, but are unable to make any commitment about publication prior to the submission of the final manuscript. All articles submitted to the *Journal* will be subjected to review by the Editors before being accepted for publication. Unsolicited articles should be sent to the attention of the Editors-in-Chief.

**Book reviews:** Suggestions for book reviews may be made to the Book Review Editors. Book reviews may only be written by scholars and practitioners of international law.

The Board of Editors will not consider submissions which have, or will be, in one form or another, published elsewhere.

Copyrights of all manuscripts accepted by the *Journal* become the property of the *Leiden Journal of International Law Foundation*.

### Guidelines for Contributors

All manuscripts must be written in English and submitted in duplicate, with both the text and the footnotes typed and double-spaced, preferably on A4 paper. The *Journal* mainly conforms to the footnote style of the most recent edition of *The Bluebook: A Uniform System of Citation*, published by the Harvard Law Review Association. All manuscripts must be submitted on 3,5 inch diskettes compatible with the IBM PC system. The *Journal* uses WordPerfect 5.1 and 6.0. The average length of manuscripts should range from 6,500 to 10,000 words for *Leading Articles*, 5,000 to 6,500 words for *Student Contributions*, 1,500 to 3,500 words for *Current Legal Developments*, 1,500 to 5,000 words for *Hague International Tribunals*, and 1,000 to 1,500 words for *Book Reviews*. The *Journal* kindly requests contributors to either *Leading Articles* or *Student Contributions* to submit an abstract of the manuscript not exceeding 125 words. All contributors should indicate their current affiliations and those brief personal details they would like to have published with the article. Detailed Guidelines for Contributors can be obtained from the Executive Production Editors.
