LAWRENCE BAUM is an Assistant Professor of Political Science at Ohio State University. Among his current interests are the implementation of judicial decisions and the judicial gatekeeping process, and he is participating in a longitudinal and comparative study of litigation and policy-making in the federal courts of appeals.

GREG A. CALDEIRA is an Assistant Professor of Political Science, The University of Iowa, and is a Ph.D. candidate in Politics, Princeton University. He is the author of articles in *Political Science Quarterly*, *Justice System Journal*, *Iustitia*, *Judicature*, and the *Iowa Law Review*. His current research interests include the impact of elite socialization on judicial decision-making; strategic choice on the U.S. Supreme Court, 1930-1976; a study of public opinion on policies toward intestacy; and comparisons of the California Courts of Appeal.

SIDNEY L. HARRING is an Assistant Professor of Sociology at the State University of New York, College at Buffalo. He earned both his J.D. and Ph.D. degrees at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. He is currently at work on a book analyzing class forces involved in the development and expansion of the police during the post-Civil War Industrial Revolution in the Great Lakes area.

WOLF V. HEYDEBRAND is a Professor of Sociology at New York University. He received his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago in 1965. He is author of *Hospital Bureaucracy* (Dunellen, 1973), editor of *Comparative Organizations: The Results of Empirical Research* (Prentice-Hall, 1973), and author (with Carroll Seron) of the forthcoming book, *Adjudication vs. Administration: The Changing Role of the Federal Judicial System*. His current research interests include the theory of the state as well as the Marxian theory of organizations, an area on which he has recently published an article in the *Sociological Quarterly*.
