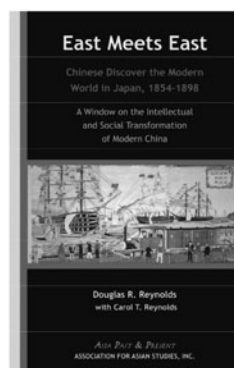

EAST MEETS EAST: Chinese Discover the Modern World in Japan, 1854–1898. A Window on the Intellectual and Social Transformation of Modern China

Douglas R. Reynolds. Pb. 978-0-924304-76-7.

East Meets East explores three important dimensions of modern Chinese history: Chinese discovery of the modern world in Japan; reports on Japan before 1890 so objective and non-Sinocentric that higher authorities suppressed them; and official innovations inside China prompted by crises which opened the gates to intellectual and social transformations at the grassroots. Meaty on-site reports of Japan were a major direct source of ideas for the Hundred Days Reforms of 1898 and the Xinzheng modernization reforms after 1901. Extrabureaucratic Ju (Bureaus) after 1863 won respect and legitimacy for “irregular path” (*yitu*) persons having modern western knowledge. Nouveaux elites at odds with the old bureaucratic *zhengtu* order and having careers tied to modernization and reform, after 1912 firmly rejected Yuan Shikai’s bid to restore the old imperial order in 1915–16. After 1916, there was no turning back. The old order and era were truly “gone with the wind.” For depth, breadth, and fresh insights, *East Meets East* is a must read.

REQUIREMENTS FOR MANUSCRIPT SUBMISSION

When preparing a manuscript, please note that JAS is committed to publishing articles based on in-depth, original research. Authors should also take care to address the interests of our broad, multidisciplinary readership by raising larger questions of interest that reach beyond their precise research specialties. Authors are encouraged to consult recent issues of JAS for guidance on style and formatting.

- Please submit all manuscripts and images to the Editor via the Editorial Manager website www.editorialmanager.com/jas/. Inquiries may be sent to jas@journalofasianstudies.org. Electronic text should use MS Word-compatible software; include a PDF file if using non-standard characters. Low-resolution images and illustrations are acceptable for the review process; all images, tables and figures should include titles or captions. Please note that in the event of publication, the author is responsible for acquiring high-resolution images along with permission to publish them. If electronic submission is not possible, please contact the editorial office at the email address, phone number or fax number listed above.
- Article manuscripts, including notes and references, should range between 8,000 and 10,000 words, or approximately thirty-five pages in length, and must include a 150 word abstract at the beginning of the document.
- Authors' names must be left off of the manuscript, as JAS engages in double-blind reviews.
- Manuscripts must be double-spaced with 12-point type and 1 inch margins including extracts, notes, and references, and formatted for letter-size (8.5 × 11 in.) paper if possible.
- Notes should be as few as possible and appear at the end of the text.
- Use parenthetical in-text citation, and author-date formatting for references per *Chicago Manual of Style*, 15th edition (Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 2003), pp. 616–24.
- Please use the following Romanization: Chinese: Pinyin; Japanese: Hepburn; Korean: McCune-Reischauer.
