Itinerancy and the Transformation of English Dissent, 1780-1830

DERYCK W. LOVEGROVE

A study of a neglected aspect of English social and ecclesiastical history – the operation of itinerant preachers during the period of social and political ferment at the turn of the nineteenth century. Dr Lovegrove examines the nature of their popular brand of Christianity, their impact on existing churches: the threat apparently posed to the established Church of England, and the consequences of their activity for the small, radical Protestant groups from which they emerged.

This innovative study of Sabbatarianism challenges the orthodoxy that it is a puritan characteristic which was among the earliest issues dividing puritans and conformists. Instead, Dr Parker uses a wide range of sources to trace the origins of this doctrine and finds a broad consensus on the issue in the Elizabethan and Jacobean Church.
