Doherty Foundation Fellowships Available for 1969–70

The Henry L. and Grace Doherty Charitable Foundation, Inc. offers a limited number of fellowships for advanced study in Latin America in the fields of social science during an academic year. The grants are made to graduate students and postdoctoral scholars who can supply sufficient evidence of training and preparation in Latin American studies. Fellowship holders are expected to spend twelve months in travel and in residence in the country in which research is to be conducted. Cost of round-trip travel for the grantee and family members and allowance for living expenses, varying with the grantee's family status and the country to which he is going, are provided by the fellowships. Applications and supporting documents must be submitted not later than February 1, 1969, on blanks obtainable from the Doherty Fellowship Committee, Program of Latin American Studies, 240 East Pyne, Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey 08540.

Fletcher School Offers Latin American Teaching Fellowships

Established in 1966, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy program of Latin American Teaching Fellowships continues for 1969–70. Eligibility requirements are that applicants must have completed at least two years of graduate study at a North American university and must be able to demonstrate teaching capabilities in their field of concentration. Writing and speaking fluency in the language of the country to which they are assigned is required. Financial stipends include full travel expenses to and from Latin America, a basic fellowship grant of approximately \$300 per month and an academic salary of \$150–\$250 per month from the Latin American institution to which the fellow is assigned, a dependents' allowance if needed, and medical and accident insurance. The fellowships in most cases will be offered for a 12–15 month period, beginning in the fall 1969. Each fellow, while in Latin America, works under the supervision of a professor and in most cases functions as a teaching assistant; opportunities for private research will be available to the fellow. Ford Foundation Has Faculty Research Fellowships

The purpose of the Faculty Fellowships, limited to approximately 40 each year, is to facilitate the completion of promising research on important problems in economics, political science, and sociology. University and college faculty members are enabled to devote full time for one academic year to research of their own choosing. Nominations are submitted by department chairmen; each eligible department, which receives forms supplied by the Ford Foundation, may nominate two faculty members and one visiting professor—only one of which might be offered an award. Nominees must hold the doctorate or an equivalent and must generally be younger than 45 years of age. A well-defined project with some preliminary work already accomplished must be submitted by the nominee. The stipend is equal to the nominee's academic salary at the time of nomination, with a modest allowance for research expenses. Nominations for the 1969–70 school year must be received by January 1, 1969. Further information is available from the Ford Foundation, 320 East 43rd Street, New York, N. Y. 10017.

HEW Offers Fellowships for Language and Area Studies in 1969–70

Approximately 30 postdoctoral fellowships for study in language and related area subjects during the summer of 1969 and through the academic year 1969–70 are offered by the Division of Foreign Studies of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. According to John Cookson of the Division, the program of fellowships will be conducted on essentially the same basis as those for previous years. To be eligible, a candidate must be a faculty member of a four-year college which already offers or has fully developed plans for undergraduate programs of foreign language and area studies. After his period of training and study, the fellowship recipient must return to his sponsoring institution. The awards include study at NDEA Language and Area Centers at U. S. universities; the summer portion should normally be spent in intensive language study and the academic year devoted to area courses with continued work in language. Separate applications are required if the candidate intends to spend the summer at one institution and the academic year at another. Stipends are based on the monthly salary of the candidate at the time of application; institutional fees are included, and, in some cases, transportation costs. Portuguese is the language utilized for Latin American studies.

Application forms and information may be requested from the Student Assistance Section, Division of Foreign Studies, Assistant Secretary of Educa-

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tion, U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Washington, D. C. 20201. Completed applications must be submitted by January 6, 1969 to the NDEA Center where the candidate plans to study. Awards, granted on the basis of recommendations from the respective Centers, are to be announced by HEW in mid-February.

Inter-American Press Association Continues Scholarship Program

The Inter-American Press Association is continuing for 1969–70 its program of journalism scholarships to newspapermen and students from the American republics. The scholarship winners study journalism for an academic year in a college or university in the United States. Applicants must have a working knowledge of English, and preference is given to those with newspaper work experience. Deadline for submitting applications is January 15, 1969; awards are to be announced at the annual meeting of IAPA in the spring.
