Announcement and Call for Papers

The skeptics, neopragmatists, poststructuralists, feminists, Marxists, historicists, Freudians, paleoconservatives, dissidents, and mavericks who have joined to establish Common Knowledge hold that fratricidal partisanship is a legacy of a time that is passing. Common Knowledge will publish work in cultural studies and intellectual history that redefines divisive terms and figures of the past and present in ways that make expanded sympathies credible. Now that the Berlin Wall is down, it is time to abandon simplistic distinctions- East versus West, left versus right, theory versus praxis, modern versus postmodern. It is time to elaborate a basis for practical, common knowledge.

Common Knowledge represents a commitment to go beyond established diciplines and, more importantly, beyond the factions at war in the literary and scholarly world. The idea that intellectual life is composed of "issues" and that issues are shaped like battlefields or game boardswith "sides" that one must "take"- is at best obsolete and impractical. Common Knowledge seeks to refine a new skepticism- a postmodern, postwar doubt of claims to knowledge and authority- that presents no obstacle to solidarity.




