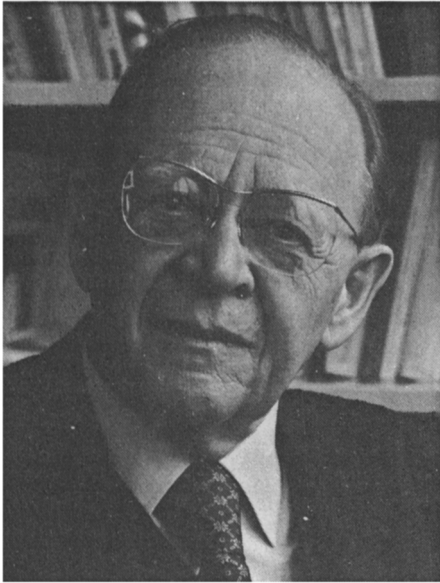

Cole Blasler, professor of political science and research professor in Latin American studies at the University of Pittsburgh, has succeeded Charles Gibson as chairman of the Advisory Board of the *Handbook of Latin American Studies*, published by the Library of Congress. Blasler was also reappointed recently to his second term as U.S. representative on the U.S./USSR Exchange in Latin American Studies under the auspices of the American Council of Learned Societies and the Latin American Studies Association.

John Brademas, former congressman and president of New York University, will inaugurate the Julian J. Rothbaum Distinguished Lectureship at the University of Oklahoma next fall. Brademas represented Indiana's 3rd Congressional District for 22 years and helped to write most major legislation concerning education, services for the elderly and handicapped, and federal support for libraries, museums and the arts.

Selection is based on nominations made by 100 anonymous nominators who submit suggestions to a 13-member selection committee. The final selection is approved by the directors of the foundation.

Kolakowski received his Ph.D. in 1953 from Warsaw University where he subsequently taught and served as Chairman of the Section of History of Philosophy. He was expelled from his position for political reasons.

Before coming to Chicago, Kolakowski taught at McGill University, University of California-Berkeley, and Yale University. His writings include books in philosophy, plays, and fiction.

One of Kolakowski's most notable scholarly achievements is his three-volume work, *Main Currents of Marxism*, published in 1978.

MacArthur Prize

Leszek Kolakowski of the Committee on Social Thought at the University of Chicago is the only political scientist among 20 recipients to be given a MacArthur Award this year. The tax-free awards typically range from \$24,000 to \$60,000 annually for five years. Kolakowski will receive a total of \$264,000.

Recipients may use the money in any way they choose and are under no obligation to the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation which funds the prizes.

Wonder Woman Foundation

Political scientist **Virginia Currey** of Dallas was one of 18 American women to receive awards from the Wonder Woman Foundation. Currey, who is associate professor of women's studies at Southern Methodist University and was just re-elected to a second six-year term on the Texas State Board of Education, was cited for her work to require textbooks to be nonsexist and nonracist.

The Wonder Woman Foundation was established by D.C. Comics, which publishes "Wonder Woman" comics, to honor women over 40 who exhibit the traits of the comic book heroine: compassion, honesty, courage, strength, and wisdom.

In Memoriam

William G. Carleton

William G. Carleton, Professor Emeritus at the University of Florida, died October

30, 1982, at Gainesville, Florida, at the age of 81.

He was author of two major books: *The Revolution in American Foreign Policy* (Random House, 1957); and *Technology and Humanism* (Vanderbilt University Press, 1970). He also had contributed chapters to 12 other books.

Professor Carleton held A.B. and M.A. degrees from Indiana University, and a J.D. degree from the University of Florida. He was associate professor and then professor at the University of Florida from 1936 to 1962. He had lectured at a number of universities in the U.S. as a Phi Beta Kappa lecturer, and had participated in numerous panels of the American Political Science Association and the Southern Political Science Association in his fields of American politics and American foreign policy. From 1940 until 1957 he was chairman of the social science course at the University of Florida.

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
