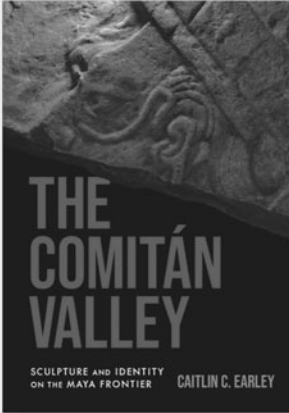

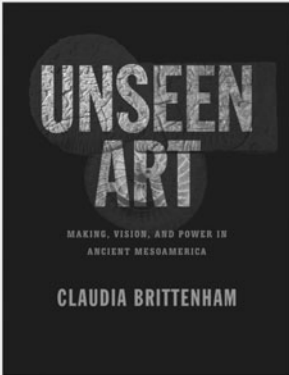

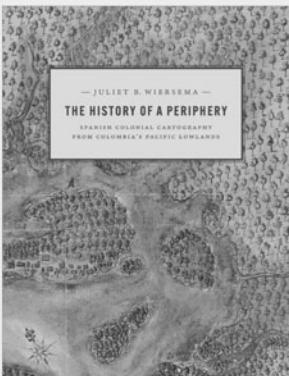

## NOTICE TO AUTHORS

*Latin American Antiquity* is a quarterly journal that publishes original papers on the archaeology, ethnohistory, and art history of Latin America and the Caribbean and all regions in the continental New World that are south of the current US-Mexico border. The journal publishes ARTICLES, REPORTS, and COMMENTS in method and theory, field research, and analysis that use a Latin American database as defined above. Authors submit manuscripts to the editor for consideration as ARTICLES or REPORTS in English, Spanish, or Portuguese. *Latin American Antiquity* has a fixed limit of 10,000 words for ARTICLES and 3,000 words for REPORTS. Tables and illustrations should be limited to those that are appropriate and necessary. Authors are required to submit manuscripts electronically through Editorial Manager<sup>®</sup> (<http://www.editorialmanager.com/laq>).
