## EDITORIAL POLICY & GUIDELINES FOR CONTRIBUTORS

The *Hague Journal on the Rule of Law* publishes two categories of articles: papers (approx. 6000–10,000 words) and notes (approx. 500–3000 words). Papers are accepted on the basis of double blind peer-review. Notes are accepted on the basis of review by two or more editors of the journal. Authors should feel free to make inquiries at the Editorial Office in case they consider writing a paper or a note. Authors are kindly requested to send their manuscript to the Editorial Office at any time of the year. All submitted materials should be in English. ### *Submission and publication elsewhere*

Manuscripts submitted to the *HJRL* must not be under consideration for publication elsewhere. Acceptance of the Editorial Board's offer to publish, implies that the author agrees to an embargo on publication elsewhere for a period of two years following the date of publication in the *HJRL*. After this two-year period, the author may republish the article elsewhere, provided only that the author notifies the Publisher and ensures that the Publisher is properly credited and that the relevant copyright notice is repeated verbatim.

### *Revision, language-editing and copy-editing*

Authors are responsible for the language-editing of their texts and copy-editing in conformity with the guidelines for authors. After acceptance of a text for publication, the fully edited and correct text must be sent to the Editorial Office within four weeks. Any (minor) changes to the text must also be made within this four-week period. Authors will *not* receive formatted proofs for correction.

### *Books for Review*

Books for review and proposals to review books should be addressed to the Editorial Office.

### *Fees*

Authors will not receive a fee, but will be presented a complimentary issue of the *HJRL* in which their contribution appears.
