## Pateman Elected President of IPSA

Carole Pateman, a British political theorist who teaches at UCLA, was elected President of the International Political Science Association (IPSA) at its triennial Congress held in Buenos Aires July 21-25.

A member of APSA, Pateman has served on APSA's Council and was the winner of the Victoria Schuck Award for her book *The Sexual Contract*, published by Stanford University Press in 1988. Prior to coming to UCLA, Pateman was a Reader in Government at the University of Sydney, Australia. She is the author of *Participation and Democratic Theory* (1970) and *The Problem of Political Obligation* (1985). Pateman succeeds APSA member Guillermo O'Donnell of Argentina as IPSA President.

APSA's 1990-91 President, Theodore J. Lowi, was elected to the Executive Committee of IPSA's Council and was named Vice President of IPSA. Also representing APSA on the Council are Harold Jacobson of the University of Michigan and Catherine Rudder, Executive Director of APSA.

The 1991 IPSA Program Chair Jean Leca of France put together a diverse program covering virtually all

fields of political science. The theme of the conference, "Centers and Peripheries in Contemporary Politics: Interdependence and Power Asymmetries," was motivated by Leca's interest in "the dominant paradox emerging over twenty years" that world politics is simultaneously seen as increasingly interdependent and increasingly fragmented. Political scientists from around the world gathered to discuss this, as well as other topics. There was a large U.S. and Western European contingent at the meeting, as well as a very strong Argentine student presence.

APSA offered travel grants to members who were delivering papers at the IPSA World Congress. The grant competition was funded by the National Science Foundation. Recipients included:
