Internship Programs

The National Center for Public Service Internship Programs has recently been established in response to student demands for meaningful and career-oriented education; the increasing demand for trained and responsible public-service manpower; and academia's reevaluation of traditional higher education. It is located at 1140 Connecticut Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C., in the offices of the International City Management Association. It was established according to its Executive Director Alan Magazine "with the conviction that internships can be a vital ingredient in higher education, and on the principle that government at all levels must be constantly renewed and improved by the infusion of new talent and new commitment in order to provide necessary services."

The Center is designed to serve generally as an advocate of the internship concept. Its present activities include: a bimonthly newsletter, a computerized leadership registry, co-sponsorship of conferences and workshops, provision of information to its members with regard to pending federal and state legislation, as well as serving as a clearinghouse of information on internship programs and activities throughout the country.

The National Center has a thirty-two member board of directors representing a broad range of interested individuals and institutions.
