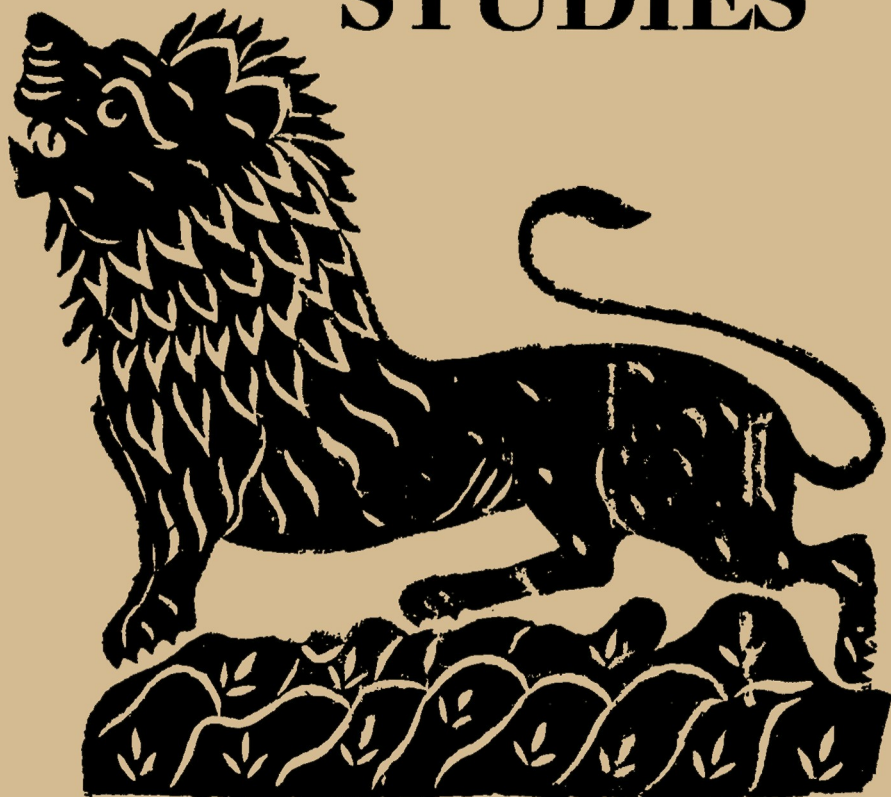

CONTRIBUTORS TO THIS ISSUE

Mary D. Condon, Assistant Professor of History at San Jose College, has completed the manuscript of a book, "Irish Land Tenure: 1820-1835."

William Huse Dunham, Jr., is George Burton Adams Professor of History and Former Master of Jonathan Edwards College in Yale University. His scholarly works include *Lord Hastings' Indentured Retainers, 1461-1483*, and *Casus Placitorum and Reports of Cases in the King's Courts, 1272-1278*.

Melvin G. Holli, Curator of Manuscripts in the University of Michigan Historical Collections, has recently published articles on American political history.

Harvey C. Mansfield, Jr., who contributed to the *Journal of British Studies* (November 1962) the article herein analysed, is Lecturer on Government at Harvard University.

Robert P. H. Mermagen, now working on his doctoral thesis at the University of Rochester, made a special study of the Oxford Movement, the churches, and the establishment, 1829-53, as a part of his honors course for the bachelor's degree at Cambridge University.

Robert Livingston Schuyler, Gouverneur Morris Professor Emeritus of History at Columbia University, is the author of *Parliament and the British Empire: Some Constitutional Controversies Concerning Imperial Legislative Jurisdiction*, and of *The Fall of the Old Colonial System: a Study in British Free Trade, 1770-1870*.

David Underdown, Associate Professor of History at the University of Virginia and author of *Royalist Conspiracy in England 1649-1660*, has recently contributed to the *English Historical Review*.

Robert Walcott, Professor of History at the College of Wooster, is the author of *English Politics in the Early Eighteenth Century* and has previously published in the *Journal of British Studies*.
