Personality Disorders: Mad, Bad or just Misunderstood. A 1-day conference to be held at Regent's College, on 15 March 2001, convened by Dr Gwen Adshead, Honorary Senior Lecturer and Consultant in Forensic Psychiatry at Broadmoor Hospital and the Traumatic Stress Clinic. The personality disorder diagnosis can give rise to problems and debate: both professional and political. The conference will look at the realities of working with patients given this diagnosis. Speakers with extensive experience in the field will review assessment. research and treatment issues. The impact on staff working with a potentially demanding group will also be looked at. Whatever the Government plans for this group, mental health services will be involved at different levels. The conference will be of interest to different practitioners of mental health care.

Dual Diagnosis – Steps in the Right Directions. A 1-day conference to be held on the 30 March 2001 at the Institute of Physics, convened by Dr Ken Checinski, Senior Lecturer in Addictive Behaviour at St George's Hospital Medical School.

The conference will explore dual diagnosis from a range of agendas and professional perspectives. It will present the case of good practice and emphasise the need to tailor the response of dual diagnosis to local situations. There will be constructive discussion about the barriers to collaborate projects and how they can be overcome. A major aim of the conference will be to identify a consensus framework for a response to this issue in a geographical area.

Dr Checinski is an enthusiastic clinician with a keen interest in service development, especially for 'difficult to reach' individuals. He is an energetic teacher and has published in the field of dual diagnosis and addictive behaviour research.

The 9th Manchester Course in Liaison Psychiatry will be held 4-8 June 2001. This is an intensive week-long course in liaison psychiatry. The White Paper Mental Health Law for the 21st Century is a major multidisciplinary conference that will examine the key features of the eagerly awaited White Paper. It is probable that the proposals will also include a framework for those considered to be 'a dangerous person with severe personality disorder'. Difficult Decisions – Ethics Support in the Delivery of Health Care is a 1-day conference to be held on 27 February 2001 at the Queen Elizabeth II Conference Centre, London. The British Medical Journal Publishing Group, in conjunction with the Nuffield Trust and the Ethox Centre, University of Oxford, is holding this conference to consider the issues relating to ethics support in the delivery of health care.

The programme will raise awareness of the ethical issues faced by clinicians in their day-to-day practice, as well as various models of clinical ethics support from the UK, USA and elsewhere. Topics for discussion in the afternoon workshop sessions include: rationing and the health authority; the place of ethics in clinical governance; e-ethics; ethics in health care management; clinical ethics committees; and primary care groups and primary care trusts – how are the ethical issues to be addressed?

The conference will be of particular interest to those already facing ethical problems in their practice, whether at clinical or management level, in NHS trusts, health authorities, health boards and primary care. The conference will also appeal to health care educators, those providing ethics support to clinicians and consumers of health care.
