WHOLE-TIME COURSES FOR POSTGRADUATE STUDENTS

August 9th-November 12th, 1965.

Basic Sciences Class for Part I D.L.O. students.

This consists of approximately 50 lecture/demonstrations on the anatomy of the head, neck, thorax and brain; 20 lectures covering the physiological aspects; 6 on applied pharmacology; and 8 on histological and pathological and bacteriological subjects. Facilities are also available for dissection of the relevant parts, and this occupies about 120 hours.

June 28th-August 7th, 1965.

Intensive Clinical Lecture Period for Part II D.L.O. and other students.

These periods are primarily designed to give a clinical survey of the whole field of the Specialty as a preliminary to practical clinical training. At the completion of the Intensive Lecture Period, selected students may be given the opportunity to serve as house surgeons in the associated hospitals.

November 10th-23rd, 1965.

Practical Revision Class for Part II D.L.O. students.

This is intended for those students who are well advanced in preparation for the examination and need only the opportunity for a final review. The class includes demonstrations of selected clinical cases and viva voce examinations.

October 11th-23rd, 1965.

Advanced Revision Course for students taking higher surgical examinations.

This is limited to senior students who are about to take the Final examination. In addition to a series of lecture/discussions at the appropriate level in the Specialty and in related branches of general surgery, there are a number of clinical and viva voce sessions and arrangements for the setting and correction of test papers.

A copy of the syllabus giving full information about the teaching and research facilities provided by the Institute, and a detailed programme of any of the courses listed above and of the short courses on specific aspects which are arranged from time to time can be obtained from the Secretary-Administrator.

The clinical practice can be joined at any time by individual arrangement with the Dean. This includes daily practical teaching in the clinics and operating theatres and ward-rounds and special demonstrations weekly.

Demonstrations of clinical cases, open clinical lectures and clinical pathological conferences are held at regular intervals throughout the year, and are open without fee to all trainees in the Specialty. A list giving dates and times is obtainable in the Secretary-Administrator's office.

Date and Place

The Congress will be held in Tokyo from October 24th-30th, 1965. The Headquarters of the Congress will be in the Tokyo Bunka Kaikan (Tokyo Metropolitan Festival Hall) situated in the Ueno Park where the Congress Bureau will be open for registration from Saturday, October 23rd, at 9 a.m.

- (5) Surgery of Maxillo-facial Injuries.

COURSE IN SURGERY OF THE LARYNX & PHARYNX
