TO THOSE WISHING TO SUBMIT MANUSCRIPTS

Manuscripts for consideration should be submitted in four double-spaced typed copies. Both indented quotations and footnotes should be double-spaced; footnotes should be placed at the end of the manuscript. Manuscripts are sent to referees anonymously and should be prepared accordingly. Library of Congress transliteration and the *Chicago Manual of Style* should be followed; manuscripts will be edited to conform to these styles or will be returned to the author for editing. In general, articles should not exceed twenty-five pages $8\frac{1}{2} \times 11$ inches in dimension. Manuscripts will not be returned unless postage is included.

The policy of the *Slavic Review* is not to consider materials that have been published or that are being considered for publication elsewhere.

Publication of articles in the *Slavic Review* is ordinarily limited to submissions by members of AAASS. Nonmembers wishing to submit manuscripts are asked to request a membership application.
